Stafford Department of Emergency Management has been extremely busy the past three months. As new COVID-19 virus variants continue to emerge both in the United States and globally, we continue to work with our Federal, State, and Local agencies to help guide local response. We held two COVID-19 vaccination clinics in Stafford to ensure residents had the opportunity to receive their first, second or booster dose. All of our Emergency Services, Police, Fire, EMS and CERT have worked together to disseminate COVID-19 Home Test Kits and N-95 Masks to Stafford residents. Since the beginning of 2022, we have conducted three large drive-through distribution events. We continue to collaborate with Stafford Social Services to ensure our vulnerable population also has the opportunity to receive these important items and working with our local health district to bring services to our homebound resident. Home test kits are still available for pickup at the Stafford Police Department - for info call (860) 684-3777. For Town residents who are homebound or have a special needs, you may request reasonable accommodations to receive these items by calling the Director of Emergency Management at 860-247-8920 with questions.

The Director of Emergency Management has reviewed and updated our Town Emergency Operations Plans, which includes our new elected officials. Since the beginning of 2022, our Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was been activated for winter storm events and has remained in partial activated mode for Covid-19 responses. The Department of Emergency Management is currently updating our EOC radio system to maintain direct contact with the State's Emergency Operations Center (EOC). This system also has direct contact with Police, Fire, EMS and Department of Public Works.

WATER POLLUTION CONTROL FACILITY

The Water Pollution Control Facility (WPCF) is relining 1,300 ft. of old clay sewer piping that was installed in the 1930's on Westford Avenue, Willington Avenue, and Curtis Street. The benefits of relining include less mess and damage to our roads. Traditional sewer line repair services, sewer contractors needed to bring in excavation equipment to dig a trench to make the repair or insert the new pipe causing traffic delays and longer construction time.. ...Faster Repairs. ...Cost-effective. ...Long-lasting Repairs. Relining these pipes will keep ground water out of our system and will be less water that needs to be treated at the WPCF.

WPCA has hired 1 new entry level individual to replace a person that had retired.

The Stafford Community Center is a multipurpose hub, providing a range of services and activities benefiting Stafford residents. Services are distinguished by three main categories:

SENIOR CENTER

The Stafford Senior Center offers programs and information to assist older adults ages 60 and up to lead more enriched lives. Programs that have remained open throughout the pandemic include:

- · Meals on Wheels
- Medical appointment transportation services for seniors and persons with disabilities.
- Municipal Agent for The Elderly providing information and referral services, distributing information, assisting them in learning about community resources, and helping them apply for benefits
- CHOICES Counseling (Connecticut's program for Health insurance assistance, Outreach, Information and referral, Counseling, Eligibility Screening).
- Renters' Rebate Program
- · Medical equipment lending library
- Application assistance for Connecticut Department of Social Services programs, such as the Medicare Savings Program and Connecticut Home Care program for the Elderly.

Last quarter, we were able to restart the on site Congregate Meals Program, which serves lunches Monday through Friday at the Senior Center to seniors and their guests. We also resumed monthly out-of-town shopping trips on our Senior Bus, weekly board games and quilting group, and a select movies and art classes.

SOCIAL SERVICES

Stafford Social Services programs are designed to assist individuals and families with meeting their basic needs. We are able to provide direct assistance through:

- Bi-weekly Mobile Foodshare distributions and our Emergency Fuel Bank and Emergency Food Bank, both of which are funded through private donation
- Community Garden there are raised garden beds located at the Community Center, providing free, fresh produce during the growing season.
- Social Services is also the Stafford intake site for the CT Energy Assistance Program, Operation Fuel, The CT Water Assistance Program, Eversource Payment arrangements, and the Salvation Army.
- Application assistance for programs offered through the CT Department of Social Services, such as Husky Health, the Supplemental Nutrition Program (SNAP), and cash assistance.
- Collaboration with Safe Net Ministries, the Stafford Family Resource Center & Early Head Start, and Santa's Toy Box to administer programs for Back-to-School, holiday assistance.

Last quarter, the Emergency Food Bank inventory was expanded to include supplies of diapers, baby wipes, and CVS gift cards purchased through a Stafford Thrift Store donation; gift cards may be used by clients for the purchase of baby formula.

COMMUNITY CENTER

The Stafford Community Center is a gathering place for meeting and event spaces for various town boards/commissions, and a venue for events that enrich our community at large. There are six boards and commissions that meet at the Center on a regular basis, as well as the Stafford Lions Club and an Al-Anon Family Group. The building has been the site for vaccine clinics, blood drives, arts and crafts shows, town police and emergency management trainings, is a rain location for the summer concert series, and host scouting events.

Our newest community partnership is with the Stafford Family Resource Center & Stafford Early Head Start, with new program space dedicated to their Learn & Play Group, for children birth to age 5 and their parents or caregivers. Each session, which meets every Tuesday at 9:30 a.m., provides young children with opportunities to develop important language socialization skills, and motor skills. Parents and caregivers interact with their children during Learn & Play Groups to support these emerging skills while also connecting with other parents, grandparents, and caregivers. The partnership gives us a valuable connection to families and serves as a gateway to learn about additional beneficial services and programs offered by the Community Center. FIRE MARSHAL

Sustained winter weather can bring a chill into our homes. Portable space heaters have become a popular way to supplement central heating or heat one room. Space heaters account for about one-third of home heating fires and 80 percent of home heating fire deaths annually. If you plan to use portable electric space heaters, make sure to follow these tips and recommendations:

- Purchase a heater with the seal of a qualified testing laboratory.
- Keep the heater at least 3 feet away from anything that can burn, including people.
- Choose a heater with a thermostat and overheat protection.
- · Place the heater on a solid, flat surface.
- Make sure your heater has an auto shut-off to turn the heater off if it tips over.
- Keep space heaters out of the way of foot traffic. Never block an exit.
- Keep children away from the space heater.
- Plug the heater directly into the wall outlet. Never use an extension cord or power strips.
- Space heaters should be turned off and unplugged when you leave the room or go to bed.

Another popular form of heating for residents is wood burning. Now that we are nearing the end of wood burning season, it is a good time to inspect and clean chimneys. More than half of all reported chimney fire occur in later winter/early spring. Always remember to burn the correct fuel in your fireplaces and stoves, you should only burn wood in a wood stove, and coal in stoves designed for coal. Be aware when disposing ashes from your stove or fireplace, never store them in a combustible container and remember ashes can stay hot for several days after the fire has gone out.

Remember to test your smoke detectors monthly. Smoke detectors are an important way to keep your family safe by providing you with early notification in case of a fire. Make sure you replace the batteries in your detectors with the time change each year. Batteries are still available from the Stafford Fire Marshal's Office during normal business hours if you need some. These batteries were given to the town as part of a grant program applied for through Energizer. Smoke detectors need to be replaced every 10-years. After 10-years the detector starts losing sensitivity and may not detect smoke in a timely manner.

As we transition from winter operations to spring operations (weather permitting), we have begun sweeping our roads, making drainage repairs, and preparing for upcoming paving projects. Please slow down for work zones to ensure the safety of our hard-working Public Works Staff.

The Parks Department has begun performing maintenance to the grounds, fields, and playscapes throughout Stafford to get them ready for warmer weather. Soon, we will see upgrades at Olympic Field to the play structures, field, and basketball courts.

PLANNING & ZONING

The Planning and Zoning Commission is currently updating The Plan of Conservation and Development. The Commission began reviewing the current plan and discussing topics ranging from Economic Development, open space, town facilities and infrastructure in March of 2021. The Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD) is a comprehensive plan for Stafford's future.

The State requires the Planning and Zoning Commission to prepare POCDs every ten years. Developing a POCD provides us an opportunity to reflect on our collective vision of our economic, natural and social environments. We then create goals and tasks to accomplish that vision. This plan acts as a statement of policies, goals and standards for the physical and economic development of the municipality. This Plan is required to be completed and approved by October 2022.

The Commission, with the assistance of David Perkins and Amber Wakley, will soon have a completed first draft of the 2022 plan available for review by other Town boards and commissions as well the residents of Stafford. It is anticipated that there will be several "workshop meetings" discussing and polishing the draft with a public hearing upon completion. If any residents, business owners or concerned parties wish to participate, they are welcome to attend the meetings and have themselves heard. The Planning and Zoning Commission meets the first and third Thursday of each month.

The Town of Stafford and Town of Somers recently joined together in an agreement that will provide needed Building Official services to the Town of Somers while they conduct a search to replace their vacant Building Official position. The Town of Stafford is very fortunate to have two qualified Building Inspectors, Glenn Setzler and Mark Morrison, who is also the Town of Stafford's Fire Marshal. This enables Stafford the ability to extend Building Official services to Somers without disruption to Stafford's Building and Fire Marshal functions. In return, the Town of Somers will compensate Stafford through sale of service fees and provision of additional Fire Marshal support. A collaboration of this kind is a new relationship for Stafford and Somers, one which First Selectman, Salverio Titus, looks forward to expanding in other areas in the future.

SURVEY AND PLANNING GRANT

\$20,000

STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICE - RECEIVED

For consultant services to complete a Historic Designation Report and the necessary documentation to nominate an area in Downtown Stafford Springs to the State Register of Historic Places. This high-level study includes field investigation, photography, archival research, and report preparation. The project will ensure the preservation of Stafford's history, the pursuant of a Historic District, spur economic development, bolster community pride, and encourage future preservation, while benefiting both residents and business owners.

AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES GRANT

\$36,000

CT DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY & ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION - PENDING

To control and eliminate water milfoil and aquatic invasive species in Staffordville Reservoir (present in 20.2-acres) and in Stateline Pond (present in 40 to 50 acres). The project works to preserve existing recreation amenities, sustain water bodies, and prevent worsening conditions.

BODY-WORN CAMERA GRANT

Aid for the costs associated with the purchase of body-worn recording equipment (as mandated by Police Accountability Act of 2020) for use by the sworn members of the Stafford Police Department.

SITE-SPECIFIC CLEANUP GRANT

\$600,000

UNITED STATES ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA) - PENDING

Abatement and Renovation of the former Earl M. Witt School to reactive the site, preserve the attractiveness of the community and Hyde Park, and improve the overall quality of life for residents.

STATE & LOCAL FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS

The Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program, a part of the American Rescue Plan ACT (ARPA), delivers \$350 billion to state, local, and Tribal governments across the country to support their response to and recovery from the COVID-19 public health emergency. The Town of Stafford will receive \$3,519,740.29 in funding. Funds must be obligated by December 2024 and spent by December 2026. Funds can only be used in accordance with the Act, which generally allows for the support of public utilities, elements of economic development, elements of social services, pandemic-related emergency services, and recovering lost municipal income.

The Stafford ARPA Committee was formed to help oversee funds, prioritize/identify projects, solicit community input, and ensure proper procurement practices. The Grants Office oversees documentation, reporting, and compliance, while pursuing additional funding opportunities through relief legislation. Public Meeting is being planned for early May, where the ARPA Committee will present planned projects and solicit input for potential expenditures. Please get involved!

ARPA COMMUNITY INPUT SURVEY

SMALL CITIES COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG)

In 2018, the Town of Stafford received a Small Cities CDBG grant from the Connecticut Department of Housing to continue its housing rehabilitation program town wide. The Program can provide eligible homeowners a 0% deferred payment loan of up to \$25,000 to make needed property improvements. The loan is repaid at sale, transfer, or refinance with cash out. Owners qualify based on their income – i.e., a two-person household maximum income limit is \$63,950. Owners must also be current on town taxes, have equity in the property and agree to the program terms and conditions. Work can include, but is not limited to new roofing, windows, heating system, septic system, electrical and plumbing upgrades. TOWN OF STAFFORD TRANSFER STATION



Recently, the Transfer Station has been experiencing problems with residents trying to get away with out paying for their trash disposal. This will not be tolerated, and the police will be notified. Those who refuse to follow the rules will be banned from using the facility.

PAY-AS-YOU-THROW PROGRAM

The Pay-As-You-Throw (PAYT) Program is a method of charging for trash disposal based on the amount disposed of – **you pay for your trash as you throw it out**. This is accomplished by purchasing and utilizing town-issued purple trash bags, available in local stores. When you use these bags, you are paying for the cost of disposal – only your cost, and not anyone else's. This disposal method is the most equitable and rewards recycling, composting, and source reduction, ultimately reducing the amount of garbage thrown away. Source reduction is the cheapest waste management strategy and thus of the highest priority. More and more communities throughout the country use this method to increase recycling and to lower costs.

The Stafford PAYT Program began November 1, 2006. Only trash contained within the town-issued purple bags is accepted through the front disposal area at the Transfer Station. Any trash not contained within town-issued purple bags is charged by weight and required to use the facility's vehicle scale. When utilizing this method residents first drive onto the scale to be weighed, proceed to the rear of the building for disposal, then are reweighed on the scale, and charged \$.09 a pound for what was disposed of. Residents will save time by using the Stafford purple bags.

TOWN-ISSUED TRASH BAGS:

There are two sizes of town-issued purple trash bags: 33-gallon bags that come in packs of 15 for \$10.00 and smaller, 15-gallon bags, that come in packs of 10 for \$8.00. These bags are available at local stores, such as in-town hardware retailers and grocers.

BULKY WASTE FEES

- Couches & Chairs \$9.00
- Box Springs & Mattresses \$8.00
- Auto & Light Truck Tires \$6.00
- Freon Units \$21.00
- Appliances \$11.00

You also have the option of hiring a private trash service for your household waste. Private trash services will provide you with their company-issued container and will pick up your trash curbside at your home. However, they will not collect bulky waste, you would still need to bring those items to the Transfer Station and pay for the disposal. Remember the more you recycle, reuse, reduce and compost the fewer bags you will need.

SWAP SHED

The Swap shed is for people to recycle items in good condition, it is not a place to dump your junk to avoid paying disposal fees. TVs, Computers, printers, appliances are NOT accepted at the swap shed. If individuals continue to disobey the rules posted at the swap shed, then the Town will have to discontinue its use.
